The grueling 24-hour Le Mans automobile race, the world's top test of speed and endurance for sports cars, satrted on Saturday June 12th. in the afternoon, and the forecast was for cool and rainy weather which dampened the attendant festival atmemsphere and slow the finely tuned racers.

Prince Bernhard of the Netherlands waved the flag setting the 57 cars off on their long grind. A crowd of about 250,000 followed the race throughout in spite of rain and cold.

The race started at 3 p.m. and continued to the same hour Sunday. Two races are run simultaneously. The one that gets the most attention is the all-out effort to go the farthest distance in the 24-gour period. The second competition is to determine which car gets the most out of its mechanical attributes. This is a complicated competition called a "Performance Inder" formula which tries to equilize the big and little cars. A new lenger, lower JAGUAR sports car has been installed as a favorite to win the race. The German Mercedez-Benz factory said it could not get its new models in shape in time for this year's race and will not be represented. There is no Italian Lancias either. A Lancia won the Panamerican road race this year and another won the Italian Mille Miglia race.

Three Italian 4.9liter Ferraris are engaged. The United States racing crew of Briggs Cunningham, of Green Farms, Conn. is also considered a big threat for the Jaguars. The wealthy car manufacturing sportsman has three cars entered in the race. Et ALE JOURNAL 6 rue Francoeur Paris(18°)

24-HOURS LE MANS AUTOMOBILE PACE

Jose Froilan Gonzales, or Argentina and Maurice Trintignant of France, drove a FERRARI to victory in the 24-hour Grand Prix endurance sports car race after a dramatic last-minute duel with a Jaguar during a rainstorm.

Tony Rolt and Duncan HAMILTON of Britain, winners of the race last year, drew within a minute and 25% of the Ferrari just one hour and 40 minutes before the end of the race when Gonzales had trouble starting the Ferrari at a pit-step. Then, with Hamilton driving the new type Jaguar and Gonzales at the wheel of the big 4.9liter Ferrari (N°4), they traded seconds back and forth in the downpour. Gonzales finally won with an advance of just one minute 44 seconds over Hamilton.

Gonzales and Trintignant covered 4061 Kilometers during the 24 hours The second-place car did 4057 Kilometers. Second was the Jaguar (N°I4) driven by Tony Rolt and Duncan Hamilton.

Sherwood Johnsten, of Rye New-Yerk and William Spear of Southpert Conncame in third covering @ 3,791 kilemeters in a Cunningham special sports car (N°2). Roger Laurent and Jacques Swaters of Belgium finished fourth in a I200 Jaguar. They covered 3,670 Kilometeral Another Cunningham (N°I) driven by Briggs Cunningham of Green Farms, Conn. and John Benett of Forest Hills N.Y. came in fith.

Prince Bernhard of the Netherlands gave the start for the sports car classie on Saturday at 3 p.m. over 200,000 people were gathered around the 13, 492 kilomete circuit in spite of rain, wind and bad weather.

The winning Ferrari was well ahead all the way except during the first hour, when it was in decond place on two occasions for several minutes. In that first hour Britain's Stirling Moss in a new type Jaguar passed the Gonzales-Trintignant Ferrari but soon fell far back with ignition trouble. The Moss Jaguar withdrew with brake trouble after nine and a hald hours of racing.

The winning Ferrari also was passed during the first hour by the Ferrari of Paole Marzotto and Umberto Magholi of Italy, but the italians soon faded and later dropped out with transmission trouble. Only 19 of the 57 starting cars finished the rainsplashed race.

In the smaller cars contest, crowned by the Endurance prize, the french car DB got the best of all other competitors even the Porsche . The French DB Panhard driven by BONNET and BAYOL got the "Endurance Index" showing steady progress on the French small cars industry.
