From Lancashire and Yorkshire they pour into Blackpool determined to have a grand holiday - and everything's off the ration. This, for instance, it's not North country roly-poly, it's Blackpool rock - but we still don't know how they get the name right through the middle. We sent another cameraman to Brighton. London by the Sea, they call it, but this was one of the days when most Londoners were staying at home.

Now comes the tricky part. Down, Down, down he comes - and a perfect two-point landing.

Our cameras cross the world - and even the Japanese are on holiday. Every year they hold a festival of kite-flying - though some of them seem to be new at the game! They've held this display in Japan for about 300 years - and one or two have been there since the first performance.

Back to London to greet the Junior Ambassador special. America

has sent us 48 of her youngsters - a boy from every State. The Variety Club organized this trip along with Bill Boyd better known as Hopalong Cassidy. After arriving at London Airport the Junior Ambassadors met the Lord Mayor of London and set off on a nation-wide tour. In Hyde Park there was a Review, of the Police, when men and women of the force from all over Britain paraded before the Queen and Prince Philip. Telephoto lenses bring the guests into close-up, as we record the elegant scene from the Palace roof.

The Queen and her husband move among the guests, chatting informally.

The Queen Mother wears a grey chiffon dress overprinted with carnations. Fashion experts agree that this is probably the best-dressed garden-party for many years.

Now from this quiet sunny afternoon scene set in the garden of a London Palace. We return to the crowded beaches of Blackpool. There's happiness in numbers and it's a paradise for millions of people to laze on the sands and have nothing to think about but the next meal --

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---or pretty girls---or handsome men. This chap coming along the promenade now, so suave, so elegant, so debonaire. That's him Terry Thomas inhaling Blackpool's bracing air.
