INDO-CHINA: HAVY ALDS EVACUATION.

Prench landing-ereft come alongside the aircraft carrier Holi-S.

Werrier, moored off Haipheng. On board are fourteen hundred refugees who are to
be evacuated by the earrier from North to South Vietnam. Two-thirds of them are
women and children. They earry with them with their few personal belongings. Many
were driven from their homes when the enemy swept through Indo-China shortly before
the truce.

With typical naval efficiency, arrangements are made to accomplate
the refugees during the journey. As each Victnamese comes aboard, he's given a
therough dusting with D.D.T. powder before and aft. Then they're carefully searched
for hand grenades or other weapons. The skip's cooks provide two meals a day of
rice and fish or meat. But they're soon in trouble, for the refugees and the Royal
Many have different ideas about how to cook rice. Once that's been serted out, a new
problem faces the crew - the stork decides to make three visits. But, thanks to
the ship's dectors, that too is dealt with satisfactory. For a few days, L.M.S.
Warrier's more like a school-playground, than a warship, but that's O.L. with the
Navy.
