ROYAL TOUR OF LANCASHIRE.

Her Majesty the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh Leave Belton Town Hall during their two-day tour of Lancashire. Alderman Peter Flanagan, the Mayer escerts the Queen who wears a turqueise coloured princess-style coat. The rain, which has been polting down most of the morning, keeps away during the reyal visit to Bolton but as Her Majesty begins her drive to Bury, down it comes again. But growds line the route just the same. Many have waited more than four hours for a glimpse of the Queen. The fine new Town Hall at Bury is opened by Her Majesty who then acknowledges the crowds' greeting from the baleony.

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The Royal couple sign the visitor's book, watched by Alderman and Mrs. Blakemore, Mayer and Mayoress of Bury.. Then, on to Manchester where it's still umbrella weather. In Albert Square, Her Majesty inspects a guard of honour mounted by the 8th Ardwick Battalaon, the Manchester Regiment.

It is at Manchester, within the Nown Hall, that the Queen takes lunch. About 370 leading citizens are present. Then follows a short visit to Oldham, and next a tour of Lilac Hill at Shaw. This is at the Queen's personal request, and she and the Duke make it the longest stop of the Lancashire Tour. Every part of the mill operations, from the raw cotton to the finished thread, is seen by the reyal visitors, who meet many of the mill's long-service employees.

And so to Bochdale as dusk falls. In this world-famous mill-town, the reyal tour comes to an end. In town and village, at every stage of their two-day journey, the Queen and Prince Philip, have received heart-warming and leval acclaim from the people of Lanonshire.
