The Borough of Lambeth has completed its 2000th home since the war. Hugh blocks of flats now stand where, but a few years ago, lay the rubble of Lambeth's blitsed houses. There are still hundreds of old dwellings in the berough - sharp contrasts to the modern new flats. Chimneys which add to London's smog menace are newhere to be seen on the new buildings.

Mrs. Hall, a pertial invalid, moved into her ground floor flat recently from one that was on the fifth floor. Now she doesn't have to be carried up or down the stairs whenever she goes in or out. The completion of the 2000th home in Lambeth brings Mr. Attlee and his wife to a civic ceremony there. Sir Lameelot Eay, the architect, who greets them, is to escert the visitors around the flats.

Inside one of the flats, Mr. Attlee steps to chat with a new tenant, an 88 year old. Then he neves on to the 2000th home to meet Mrs. Hall. Referring to the housing he saw when in Russia, Singapere, Berlin and China, Mr. Attlee says "They're doing their best, but they don't come up to Lambeth".
