The giant R.O.A.C. Stratocruiser "Conspus" lands at Pierce Airport, bringing Her Boyal Highness Princess Margaret to the West Indies. The Princess, who wears a being taffeta dress and a small silk hat, is welcowed by Sir Herbert Rance, the Governor, on behalf of all the people of the islands Her Royal Highness will visit. Lady Rance adds her greeting.
