The Cave is fourteen thousand fost up at Amernath in the Kashmiri mountains where the god Shiva is said to dwall. Hvery year, thousands of hindas gather at Pahalgan for the ardnows four-day pilgrimage to Shivas' ice cave, where they will wash away their sing.

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Nost of these pilgrins come from the het plains of India, and for them, the climb towards the eternal Himalayan snows is more bitterly cold than they have over known. But they believe that stremmous journeys such as this can purge them of their sins of mortal life, so they go on their way cheerfully.

Non, women and children make the pilgrimage because of the rarefied air frequent stops for rest and prayer are made.

Holy men loading the pilgrimage carry the "Chari", walking stick of the ged Shiva.

New at last the simult draws near; the end of the wreay climb is in sight. Here, at last, the pilgrims can look on Shiva's Lee Cave. To the people of many faiths, mountain tops have always second symbols of spiritual achievement. The Hindm has sensithing in common with the religions of all the world, when he feels that here he can shed his faults and begin life anew.
