EASTER GARDEN

THE SYMBOLISM OF THE EASTER SEPULCHRE

A^S you approach the Easter Sepulchre, you see first of all the Font, above which hovers the Holy Ghost portrayed as a dove : so the Christian approaches the mysteries of the Faith through the water of Baptism.

Then you enter a garden, shaded by trees and full of spring flowers, a place of quiet meditation : yet such a garden was chosen by God as the scene of the most cataclysmic event in history—the Resurrection of His Son from the Dead.

You see represented what the first witnesses described—the rock-hewn tomb, its door rolled back by the angel, and the graveclothes lying as they fell when the body of the Lord passed into the risen life from the wrappings of death.

Above the tomb rises the empty Cross, now seen to be the symbol of triumphant sacrifice. A chalice and paten stand at the foot of the Cross and upon a Bible, to remind us of a sacrament which was instituted like Baptism as a part of the Gospel itself, and through which we too may have personal experience of Christ's Risen Body. Behind the chalice an open Prayer Book suggests the Church's part in the ministry of Word and Sacrament.

The two angel-guardians indicate that the mighty events of Christ's Incarnation, Death and Resurrection are of concern to "Worlds Invisible," as well as being our hope and faith.

The words, "Why seek ye the living among the dead?", in the Gospel spoken by the angel, and here shown engraved on the rock, recall that the story of Easter is not merely an event in the past, but the most vital reality in our present experience.
