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THE QUEEN IN SCOTLAND.

In the forecourt of the Palace of Holyroodhouse, the Queen meets Highland dancers who have been entertaining her and her guests - a pleasant break in the arduous programs of Her Majesty's tour of Scotland.

The fellowing morning, St. Giles' Cathedral is the scene of an ancient ceremony - the installation by the Queen of two new members of the Order of the Thistle. The Reyal Company of Archers form the Guard of Honour.

Wearing the robes of the Order, the Queen walks in solemn procession with the mambers of Scotland's cutstanding Order of Chivalry. She is followed by the Duke of Edinburgh, The new numbers being installed are Sir John Stirling and Lord Mathers.

For the Queen and the Duke's visit to Berwick-en-Tweed, the whole town turns out to give them a welcome. They wave to the growd from the Town Hall steps.

At the Old Bridge, a 12-pound malmon, caught in the Tweed a few hours before, is presented to Her Majesty by Mr. James Bood, Secretary of Berwick Salmon Pisheries.
