Foreign Minister Selayn Lloyd hurries to Ne.10, Telland by his French colleague Christian Pineen, for emergency talks brought about by Egypt's seisure of the Sues Ganal Company, in which Britain and France hold the bulk of the shares. Mr. Robert Murphy of the American State Department is also at the talks and the U.S. Charge d'Affaires, Mr. Poster.

War Minister Antheny Head arrives - for though everyone hopes the Suez Ganal crisis will not become a military one, any argument over the Ganal - the most strategically vital of all waterways - touches a tender spot, and Britain must be ready for any emergency. General Templer, Earl Mountbatten, and other service chiefs are on hand for consulation. The Lord Privy Seal Mr. R.A. Butler is also present at the most fateful discussions Downing Street has seen for many months.

Heanwhile in Caire, Widly cheering growts greet premier Masser as he beturns from Alexandria. Latest news suggests Masser is climbing down a little on the question of Canal dues - but the greb remains.

While the crisis continues, Britain's bases in the Mediterranean must be kept fully up to strength. At Southampton, reinforcements leave for Cyprus in the brand-new troopship "Newsa". If military action should be necessary, the already troubled island of Cyprus would become an important link in the chain of communications.

This is the Nevan's maiden voyage, and whatever the future holds for her passengers, they have no worries about the journey, for they're travelling under conditions their fathers would have envied. The 20,000 ton Nevasa is the largest British troopship ever to be designed specially for the purpose.
