"I am going to take every action that is pessible, to protect myself and the club in particular, as the P.A. Rules are antiquated, and so much out of date. They can act as inquisitor, jury, judge and hangman: Even a criminal is taken to a court of appeal - but with the Football Association, No."

"If it draws attention to the fact that there has been money available in the game which could not legally be paid to players, I feel that it does indicate some fault in the system, and will materially benefit the cause of the Union...Any ambitious lad that is earning £15. per week in the game, and naturally enough would be looking for the next pound or two to add to his wages, has got to turn his attention outside the game".
