Dear Sir,

Enclosed are details of the visit of H.M.S. SHRIMP - an "X" type five-man midget submarine - to Bristol and the River Severn between 13th and 30th October, 1957, and I hope that you will find it possible to cover some parts of the visit.

As the visit is classed as "Operational", only limited time is available for Press visits, but at the following times both the escort vessel, H.M.S. SHALFORD, and the midget submarine, H.M.S. SHRIMP, will be open to the Press:-

<u>Photographers</u> can also be provided with facilities aboard <u>H.M.S. SHALFORD</u> during any of the dives to be made by H.M.S. SHRIMP, or during the frogmen displays.

It <u>might</u> be possible to arrange for one or two reporters to be accommodated in the midget submarine during programmed diving demonstrations at Gloucester and Bristol. Will you please let me know by 10th October whether, if this facility is approved, you would wish one of your reporters to be included in the party. If, as seems possible at the moment, only two Press representatives can dive in the midget submarine at each of the two places (Gloucester and Bristol), selection may have to be made by ballot.

It should be noted that although both H.M.S. SHALFORD and H.M.S. SHRIMP will be open to inspection by organised parties of schoolboys and Sea Cadets, and by the Press, <u>only H.M.S. SHALFORD (and NOT H.M.S. SHRIMP)</u> will be open to the public.

If you intend to be represented at any one of the press visits, it would be appreciated if you would let me know in order that the necessary arrangements can be made.

MIDGET SUBMARINE TO SAIL UP RIVER SEVERN

FIRST VISIT TO THE PROVINCES

One of the Royal Navy's midget submarines - H.M.S. Shrimp - will be paying an operational visit to the River Severn from 13th to 30th October, and will be visited by hundreds of schoolboys, Sea Cadets and Naval Reservists, at Sharpness, Saul Junction, Gloucester, Tewkesbury, Worcester, Upton on Severn, and Bristol.

In addition the <u>ship escorting H.M.S.</u> Shrimp - the Seaward Defence Boat, H.M.S. <u>Shalford</u> - will be open to the public at both Gloucester and Bristol, and there will be demonstration dives by H.M.S. Shrimp, and displays by Frogmen at Gloucester and Bristol.

One of these midget submarines visited the Thames in June 1957, but this is the first time one of them has sailed as far inland as Worcester. In fact, it is believed to be the first time an H.M. ship has visited Worcester.

<u>H.M.S. SHALFORD</u>, the escorting vessel, was the first of a new class of Seaward Defence Boats. There are now three such ships in commission in the Royal Navy (Shalford, Aberford, and Camberford) as well as some in the Commonwealth Navies, some acting as tenders to R.N.V.R. Divisions, and some in reserve.

Ships of this class are 117 ft. long, 20 ft. wide, with a draught of 8 ft. and a displacement of 110 tons. The Shalford has a complement of three officers and 18 ratings.

Built primarily to patrol harbour approaches and anchorages, the role of Seaward Defence Boats is to seek out and destroy midget submarines and underwater saboteurs, and generally to protect shipping from any underwater attack in confined coastal waters.

H.M.S. Shalford is fitted with radar, a small gun, Asdics, depth charges, and the Squid Ahead Throwing Mortar, and can be used as a small escort vessel for convoys.

This class is named after English villages, and the Shalford has been officially adopted by the village of the same name near Guildford.

H.M.S. Shalford is commanded by <u>Lieutenant Commander L. A. W. Pease, R.N.</u> -Transferred to the Royal Navy from the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve as a Lieutenant in January, 1947. He was granted a permanent commission in the Executive Branch in April, 1952, and was promoted to Lieutenant Commander in January, 1953.

In January, 1947, he was serving in Malta on an Extended Service Commission, and in November, 1950, was appointed to H.M.S. Lochinvar, the Naval Base at Port Edgar.

He was later appointed to the Aircraft Carrier Indefatigable and the Aircraft Carrier Ocean, followed by a shore post in H.M.S. Blackcap, the Royal Naval Air Station Stretton. He became Commanding Officer of H.M.S. Shalford, and Senior Officer of the 1st F.B. Squadron in November, 1956.

H.M.S. SHRIMP is one of a class of midget submarines whose role is to attack enemy shipping in harbours and anchorages. Known as "%" Craft, they have a length of 53 ft. $10\frac{1}{2}$ ins., and a beam of 6 ft. $3\frac{1}{2}$ ins. Their small size greatly aids them in making an underwater approach and withdrawal undetected.

Designed to be towed to within striking distance of their target by a large submarine, they are manned during the passage by a crew of four men in order that the operational crew of five who relieve them before the craft is slipped to proceed under her own power may be as fresh as possible for the actual attack.

"X" Craft played an important role in the last war.

It was two midget submarines - X6 and X7 - which, out of an attacking force of four, succeeded in seriously damaging the German battleship Tirpitz in Alten Fiord, Norway, on 22nd September, 1943.

The attack was one of the most remarkable of the war. The midgets were towed by large submarines 1,000 miles and left to negotiate the last few miles to their formidable target under their own power through confined waters protected by minefields, nets, searchlights, and patrol boats with depth charges.

Lieutenants D. Cameron, R.N.R. and B. C. G. Place, R.N. were awarded Victoria Crosses for this action.

The crew of one of the midget submarines were prisoners on board the Tirpitz when the battleship was lifted about five or six feet out of the water by the explosion of one of the charges released under her hull.

H.M.S. Shrimp is commanded by <u>Lieutenant B. O. Forbes, R.N.</u>, who joined the Royal Navy in September, 1947. He was promoted to Midshipman in September, 1948, Sub Lieutenant in January in 1950, and Lieutenant in December, 1951.

He commenced his career in submarines in the summer of 1950 after earlier service in the Battleship H.M.S. Vanguard and the Aircraft Carrier H.M.S. Illustrious.

He was appointed to the Depot Ship Maidstone, and H.M.S. Dolphin, the submarine base at Gosport for training, and joined his first "boat" - H.M.S. Springer - in January, 1952.

Since that time he has served also in the submarines H.M.S. Trespasser and Taciturn, and in March, 1956 he became First Lieutenant of H.M.S. Sleuth.

He was appointed to "Midgets" in May, 1956, and commanded H.M.S. Sticklebat until October, 1956, when he took command of H.M.S. Shrimp.
