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ROAD BUILDING MARVEL IN FORMOSAL

Through mountains that tower to 10,000 feet, across spectacular canyons, through the rugged country of central Formosa, Nationalist China is building a highway. As primitive as is most of the terrain, so is most of equipment at the disposal of the 11,000 workers. But they have a tradition for monumental construction it goes back to the great wall. In building the 190-mile highway, 26 bridges are needed to span a network of rivers and gorges.
