On the opposite wing the ball went towards Peyton, but the Waterford goalkeeper Dumphy easily had the situation in hand. It surprised most of the crowd that after the tonic of that early goal, St. Patricks got no more in the first half. So the score remained, St. Patricks, one; Waterford, nil, at half time.

Waterford soon had the ball in their opponents' goal area on the resumption. If they could get a goal in the early stages they'd be back in the game. Centre-forward Fitzgerald had a try, but Lowry kept the St. Patricks goal out of harm's way.

Waterford pressed again. St. Patricks right-half Towny Dunne handled. Penalty for Waterford. Dixie Hale took the kick and nearly sent the ball into orbit.

What an escape for St. Patricks. It galvanised them into attack. Peyton scored from 18 yards out.

St. Patricks were two clear goals ahead. Waterford would have to perform miracles to win now.

St. Patricks had another corner. With luck they might have scored again. Dunne headed, but Dumphy got the ball away. At the other end Waterford were rewarded at last. Pitagerald scored.

But one goal wasn't enough, and when the last whistle blew St. Patricks had won the Cup by two goals to one. And what heroes they were.

There wasn't a happier man in Dublin than St. Fatricks skipper when he received the Cup from Minister of Justice Traynor, President of the F.A.I.
