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## Grand Prix of Germany in Berlin

The Grand Prix on the famous Avus-Track near the Berlin Hadio Tower was the most important sports-event which took place after the war in Berlin.

65,000 racing fans watched the formula I cars compete for the Grand Priz of Germany. The international ace-drivers went over the 8,5 kms track for two trial runs before the actual race began. It was half-an hour later due to rainfall.

A two minutes' silence was observed in hounor of the French driver Jean Behra who had been killed in the Saturday's race for sports cars.

60 laps or 498kms had to be covered. The participants had been warned to koop to the lower security girdle of the Mortnern bend. But the speeding was so enormous - the laps of 8 kmm were covered in less than 2 minutes - that the warning was not heeded. Jean Bekraa (Nr127 struck a pole and was instantly killed. (Our coverage includes Behra during a test-lap)

Stirling Mess (No.7) did not make more than the second lap due to angine trouble! There was an embittered fight for t e leading position between the tree Farraris with Brooks (No.4), Hill (No.5) Gurney (No.6) and the Cooper-car of Gregory (no.3) from USA. Gregory was faster in the straights but the Ferraris managed the bends better.

In the 7th lap Hans Hermann toughed a straw-bale at the Southern bodd. The car overturned several times. But happily Hermann scrembed out of the Car and was only badly bruised. The car began to burn.

Buring the first 10 laps Brooks led the field followed by Gregory on a Cooper - Gurney on Ferrari - Hill on Ferrari and Brebham world champion condidate No 1 on Cooper.

After 24 laps Gregory's Cooper was finished.

In the 18th lap Brooks made a new record 2:04,5 (239,9km/hour)

After 30 rounds Brooks was leading with an average of 227,6 km/hrs. 200 metres back was Gurney. Half a lap back Hill. It was a Ferrari day.
