Two-day Air Pilgrimage to Dachau (Munich Airport)

TUESDAY & WEDNESDAY SEPTEMBER 1st & 2nd, 1959

On the 1st September, 1959, the twentieth anniversary of the invasion of Poland, the Ryder Cheshire Foundation, in conjunction with the All Night Vigil Group, is leading a pilgrimage to Dachau.

Dachau was built in 1933 and was the first of the Nazi Concentration Camps. Parts of it have been preserved as a memorial, and the room in which the condemned victims were kept before their death has been converted into a Chapel. It was the chief camp for Priests, and of the 2,500 who were sent there only 800 survived many of whom, by reason of the tortures they endured, are still unable to pursue their priestly duties. These are but a minute part of a vast army of men women and children, of whom more than 15 million were put to death—7 a minute for every minute of the War—and whose sacrifices and courage under great suffering in these infamous camps, helped purchase the peace that we ourselves enjoy today. It is in their honour that this pilgrimage is organised.

Even as the Catacombs—the shrine of the Early Christian martyrs—have been venerated by pilgrims down the centuries, so also Dachau, enshrining as it does the heroism of these martyrs of our present century, has become hallowed ground and a place of pilgrimage no less worthy and inspiring.

Pilgrimages arranged in confunction with Father Roht, the Chaplain at Dachau, who himself was a prisoner there for 3½ years.
