CANADA'S CATTLE KINGDOM

A MAGNIFICENT WESTERN CANADIAN PANORAMA -----BIG BUSINESS ON THE BIGGEST RANCH IN CANADA

Douglas Lake, December, 1959.

In December, 'get along little dogie' really takes on meaning at Douglas Lake, Canada's largest cattle ranch. On this 510,000 acre cattle kingdom, spaces are so vast that coyboys ride for days without reaching its borders. Rounding up 14,000 head of cattle for big drives from the snow covered summer pastures to the home range winter grazing grounds is a mammoth job which takes weeks.

Situated in the southern third of British Columbia in the interior of the province near the town of Merritt, Douglas Lake is the last great western frontier. It is cowboy country with rolling hills and lush grazing grounds. Time on the range moves with the pace of the placid white faced Hereford herds --- one of the world's top breeds.

In the late fall snow covers the summer grazing grounds and the cattle drift down from the hills with their calves into natural sorting areas. Hard-working, hard-driving cowhoys spend days "cutting out" cows with steer calves and heifer calves. With a herd of about 2500 they start the two-day drive to the home pasture area.

From the snow covered hills the magnificent herd ambles along at an even pace for the long drive. Starting about 7 a.m. the drive goes on until early evening. Driving 2500 bawling cows and calves in a herd keeps the cowboys and their horses on the move every minute. The drive is strung out for a mile as they move along the trails through the valleys.

On the second day cold air from the mountains and the warm air from the valleys creates a fog which settles over the herd. The effect of the fog with the driving cattle and horses and riders creates a scene rarely photographed.

The dampness in this valley chills the cowboys and it's time for a coffee break. Riding in through the fog, the four horsemen are glad of the open fire and a chance to warm hands and insides with the steaming brew.

Two days later the big drive reaches the home range grazing grounds. Crossing a highway bridge the cattle are pushed in order not to hold up traffic. A stream of cattle pours through the final gate and into the home pasture. Here they will remain all winter -- to eat grass as long as possible and be fed hay as the snow finally covers even these green fields.

A magnificent Western Canadian panorama --- big business on the biggest ranch in Canada.

CANADA'S BIG CATTLE ROUNDUP

The real West still lives. At Douglas Lake, Canda's largest cattle ranch, the winter roundup still calls for genuine cowboys on horses to drive the cattle as their fathers and grandfathers did before them. Fourteen thousand head of cattle have to be driven home to pasture before the summer grazing grounds are hopelessly covered with snow. Cold air from the mountains and warm air from the valleys create fog scenes rarely photographed. It's a relief to stop and make a fire for a coffee break, before the two-day long drive resumes its slow pace. That sure was good, but the 25 hungred thereford in this herd will never get there unless we push on. The distances are great on this 510-thousand-acre cattle kingdom, and the men must stay alert to keep the herd intact until that winter home is reached.
