In the front row, were Jimmy Wilde, Wells, Carpentier himself and Ted Broadribb. The French ideal, who was guest of the evening, lacked only weight to be Heavy-Weight Champion of the World.

Now for the real thing. Wally Swift fighting Brian Curvis for the Welterweight Championships of Great Britain and the British Empire. Reg King's prometion at Nottingham Ice Stadium. Curvis, the southpew, already holds the Empire title; Wally Swift, the British Championship. Experts predicted a Curvis wim. Most of the growd favoured Swift. Now on the sepes. He's a Nottingham man.

By round 8 Curvis was well shead on points. Wally Swift seemed to find that southpaw stance difficult to cope with. Curvis sent him to the canvas with a left to the jaw. He took a count of eight.

Like the born fighter he is, Curvis tore in with everything he had.

Tommy Farr sensed a kill as Curvis even ingreased the pressure.

Wally Swift just rose at 9. He must have had all the courage in the world. No one now expected the bout would go the distance. And yet it did. Somehow Swift recovered sufficiently to stay on his feet.

That was the end and the referee had no hestition in declaring Curvis the wimmer. Now British British Champion, as well as Empire, Brian Curvis of Swansea received the Lonsdale Belt.
