DOCTORS GIVE BELLS!

S t. Andrews, Hempstead, in Essex, has a recently restored tower and new bells, but visitors come to it for another reason. For this is the burial place of the founder of modern medical science, William Harvey who discovered the circulation of blood. Appropriately, some prominent doctors attended the dedication of the bells. Sir Charles Dodds, President, Royal College of Physicians, Mr. Matthews, President of the Harveyian Society and the Treasurer of the Imperial Cancer Research Fund, the eminent surgeon Mr. Dixon Wright. He read the second lesson.

Over loud speakers, the service was heard by many whom the little church couldn't hold. Then, entrance was demanded by the Bishop of Colchester. The cost of restoring the tower and providing new bells was borne by the Harvey Memorial Fund and the Harveyian Society. One fifth was subscribed by Americans. The Bishop performs the dedication.
