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At the conclusion of the historic Atlantic Conference, Britain's great Statesman, aboard the 35,000 ton battleship PRINCE OF WALES, heads for home across the ocean which unites the two great English speaking nations. In mid-Atlantic the monster warship steams through an eight mile long convoy of tankers, freighters and supply ships, all loaded down to the water line with war material from America. A magnificent sight to stir the imagination of us all. From the masthead of the battleship is hoisted the signal "Churchill wishes you good luck and bon voyage".

In brilliant sunshine the PRINCE OF WALES arrives at Reykjavik. Onto the quayside of Iceland's capital city steps Mr. Churchill to receive a warm reception from the islanders. R.A.F. and Naval units form a guard of honour as the Prime Minister arrives on his goodwill mission.

During an official call on the Regent at Government House, Mr. Churchill is enthusiastically cheered when he makes an appearance on the Balcony. A spontaneous tribute by the Icelanders to the man they most wanted to see. The visit to the Island is also marked by a parade of Naval, Military, and Air Force personnel. Men of many nations who have won the respect and admiration of the people of Iceland.

Airmen of the Royal Australian Air Force march in line with their brothers from the British Isles, and their cousins from the United States who have come to share the guardianship of the important island in the Atlantic ocean... guarantors of independence and freedom.

When sailing time comes Mr. Churchill is given a great send off. The whole town flocks to the piers to witness his departure. The Prime Minister takes his leave and prepares to embark on a Destroyer which will carry him to the waiting battleship now lying at anchor. And now a final handshake with Iceland's Premier.

From Iceland's friendly quayside, Destroyer slips away as the final stage of a historic journey is entered upon. The whole world, civilised and uncivilised awaits the repercussions of a momentous meeting.

And we like the long familiar gesture which now stands for victory.

The great warship PRINCE OF WALES with her escort of destroyers forms up ready for the great home-coming of Britain's bulldog Statesman.

And now from the deck of Britain's latest and strongest ship, Mr. Churchill bids farewell to officers and men.

After the framing with President Roosevelt of the famous new Magna Charter, of the world. Mr. Churchill is brought safely through the war zone in which the battle of the Atlantic is being fought. Another fine tribute to the invincible Royal Navy, which the Premier fully recognises as he waves farewell to the men who got him there - and brought him back.

At King's Cross Station a hearty reception awaits him. A warm embrace from Mrs Churchill is accompanied by the cheers of Londoners massed behind the railings to catch a glimpse of "Good old Winnie".

As a postscript to this magnificent Anglo-American conference on the high seas we may surely regard it as a foundation stone upon which will be built the future destiny of mankind.
