On the debit side of America's shipping ledger, the gutting of the Transport WAKEFIELD by fire of "undetermined origin" was a heavy loss. In pre-war days she was the 24,000 ton liner MANHATTAN, queen of the American Merchant fleet. Sailing recently in convoy with sixteen hundred souls aboard, fire broke out and rapidly spread through the shipe Escorting warships closed in to rescue every one of the sixteen hundred. The charred hull was later taken in tow and brought safely to port.
