DICENIOUS SHIP REPAIR.

This ship arrived at a South African port with her Hull badly damaged - and fer several reasons there was no chance of getting her into dry dock. But allied ships must be repaired without delay. A pentoen, which substituted for a dry dock, was ingeniously devised and built by a party of Dutch maval shipwrights who escaped from the Naval Base at Sourabaja, in Java, and arrived in the Union recently.

The pentoons water tight tanks were fleeded to enable it to be pushed under the ship. The tanks were then bleum and the pentoon lifted the fere part of the ship and left a dry chamber between the hall and the pentoen. Werkmen were soon on the job - rivetting their attention on it. Not only did they have to repair a huge hele in the side of the ship (with heavy damage extending 75 feet from the how) but the bettem had been buckled for some distance.

With the bull high and dry inside the pentoen, the men were able to get right undermeath the ship. The affected the repairs and practically rebuilt the whole of this section of thr bull. Bouth Africa's ever-expanding ship-repair industry provides an important link in the chain which keeps the great allied conveys moving endlessly over the Seven Seas.
