In January 1953, the twenty-thousand-ton liner Empress of Canada caught fire in the Gladstone Dock, Liverpool and became a total less. Now --- nearly two years later --- she has been raised and patched up ready to sail for the last time. The galland survivor of many a perileus wartime voyage, has been beught by an Italian firm and is being towed to Genea for breaking up.

As she left Liverpeol --- the crew of the new liner Sexonia, berthed alengside, waved good-bye. And there she goes on her maiden veyage --- another Cunarder to fellow the great tradition of the past and present. Good luck to her --- and to all who sail in her.
