Mr Macmillan, arriving in Bonn for talks with the Federal Chancellor of Western Germany, was welcomed at the airport by Dr Adenauer. It is understood that high on the agenda for the discussions between them were the forthcoming withdrawal of British troops from Germany and gazax general questions of the defence of Europe.

The meeting of British Premier and Federal German Chancellor recalls the three-power conference between Britain, the U.S.A. and Russia immediately after the war --- when the problems of building a new world amid the ashes of the old were the first concern of all men. In Germany, the task of physical recenstruction of her bombed and burnt out cities has gone on apace.
