

ATCM STATION IN SCOTLAND.

In the field of atomic research for purposes of peace, Britain scored another first. At Dounreay, in the north of Scotland, the Atomic Energy Authority is building what is called a fast breeder reactor. It will generate heat to the figure of sixty thousand kilowatts. What makes it different is that it will create more atomic fuel than it burns up. Previous methods have been prodigally wasteful of the supplies of precious uranium.
